

Visitor Update

Museum visitor numbers have continued to improve, and should comfortably exceed 3500 for the first time since 2019. Hopefully, an advertising campaign on local buses, starting this month, will help increase visitor numbers further.

Donations from visitors to the Museum are also increasing but not at the same rate as visitor numbers. However, we hope that our recent acquisition of an EFTPOS machine will help to rectify this.

Faced with increasing numbers of people not carrying cash, we have been offering visitors the option of donating by online banking.

Therefore, the Committee decided on a three-month trial of EFTPOS (December - February). While visitors can still make cash donations, they will now also have the option of using EFTPOS.

Champion Cottage Update

The big news is that the renovation of Champion Cottage is nearing completion. The grant the Society received from Foundation North has allowed us to replace and repair the weatherboards on the cottage and completely repaint its exterior. The work should be completed later this month.



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Then we'll need to restore the displays in the cottage and tidy up the garden around it.

To this end, we have scheduled a working bee for Tuesday, December 12, beginning at 10:00 am or, if the weather is uncooperative, on the following Tuesday, December 19, at the same time.

The anticipated completion date for Champion seems appropriate, for it coincides with the 40th anniversary of the original Museum opening to the public on its original Ostend site on December 12, 1983. It was subsequently "officially opened" by the then Governor General, Sir David Beattie, on February 27, 1984.

The date is also approximately the 30th anniversary of the removal of Champion Cottage from its original site in Wattle Road, Oneroa.

With Champion returned to its former "glory", we will be able to turn our attention to refurbishing and updating displays in other parts of the Museum. First up will be the exhibition "Power comes to Waiheke/Life before electricity," marking the 70th anniversary of the reticulation of electricity on Waiheke in 1953 and 1954.

Heritage Sunday Events

Our Heritage Sunday events have continued with a folk music concert by The Wellerman in October, a demonstration of spinning last month and for this month, **December 10**, Christmas wreath making led by Kate Bryant. January's event, a demonstration of butter making and another utilising our antique woodworking tools, will highlight several significant parts of the Museum's collections.

The Wellermen will return in February, and we hope to combine their performance with a family picnic day on the museum grounds. Keep an eye out for this.

While attendance at our Heritage Sunday events has not been what we hoped we will be continuing with them in 2024 and putting more emphasis on advertising the events.

Any suggestions for future events will be gratefully received, especially if you can offer to organise the event.

"Kai for Community Waiheke Food Festival"

Another event to mark on your calendar on **April 7**. While not strictly an Historical Society event, it is being organised by one of our members, Tanya Batt, hosted at the Museum.

The Society will also be assisting by providing volunteers on the day as required. It will take the place of our Heritage Sunday event for April

The Festival will offer a variety of activities including food-related demonstrations, opportunities to sample and buy locally grown or produced food and displays of home-grown produce. -->

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It will also include a digital storytelling element, providing information about the food history of Waiheke, which will become a permanent fixture.

Heritage Garden

The Committee is also hopeful that the Festival might provide an impetus for a long-planned but much-postponed project to develop a heritage garden on the Museum's grounds. Members are invited to share their views on whether this would be a worthwhile project for the Society to undertake.
